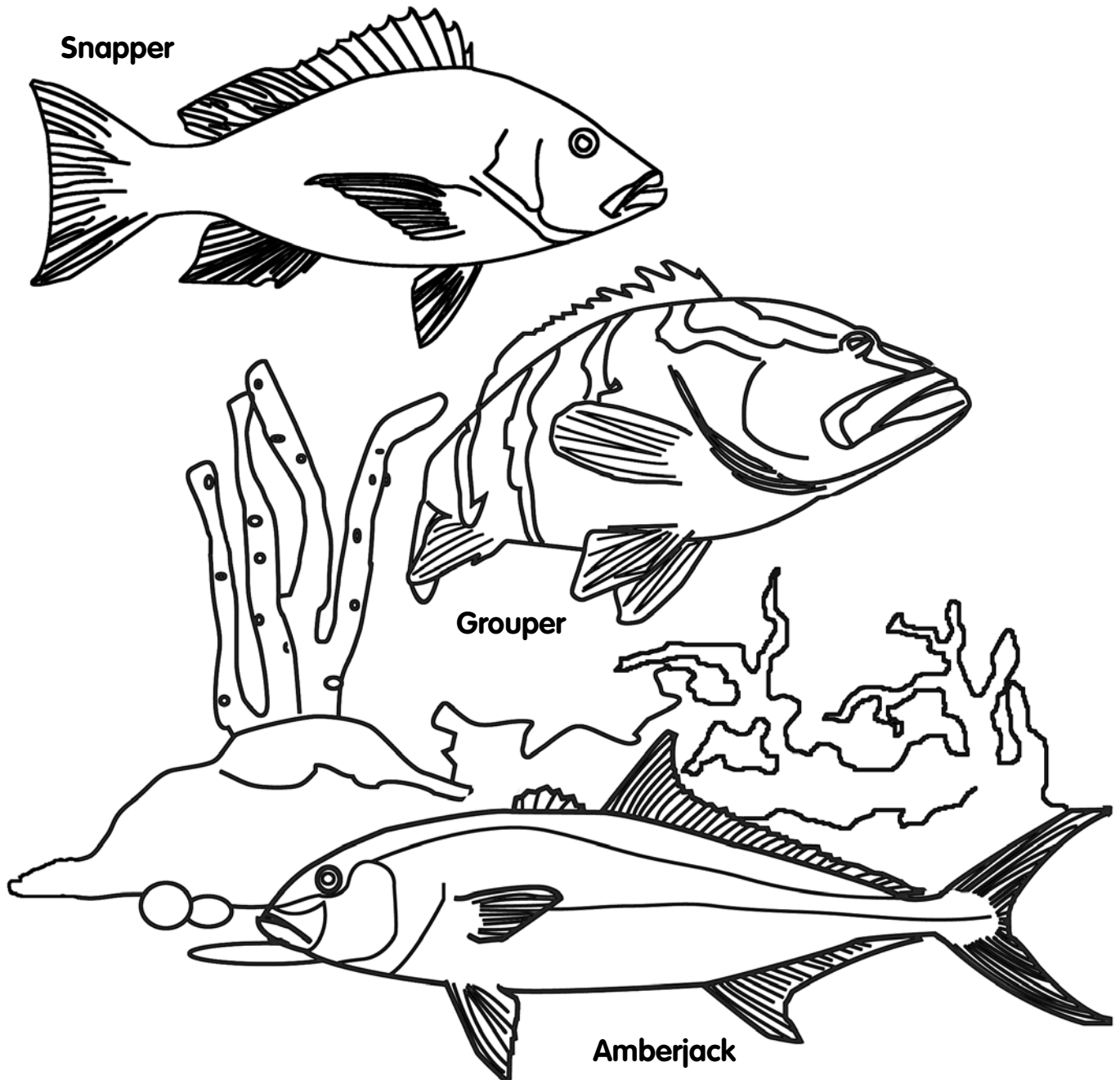


Seafood Industry



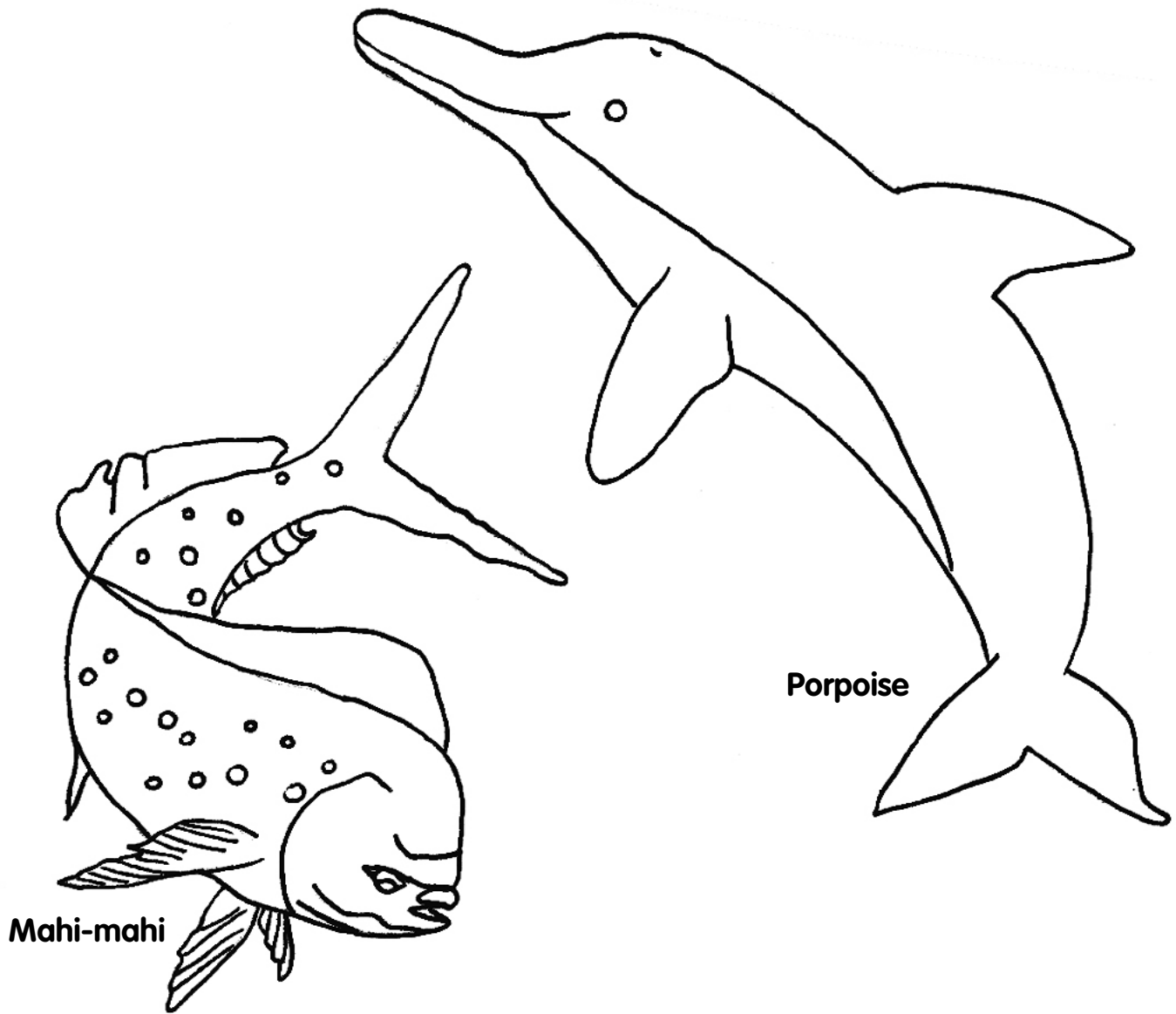
Florida has 1,197 miles of coastline. The Florida fishing industry is very valuable to the United States.

Reef Fish: Amberjack, Snapper, and Grouper



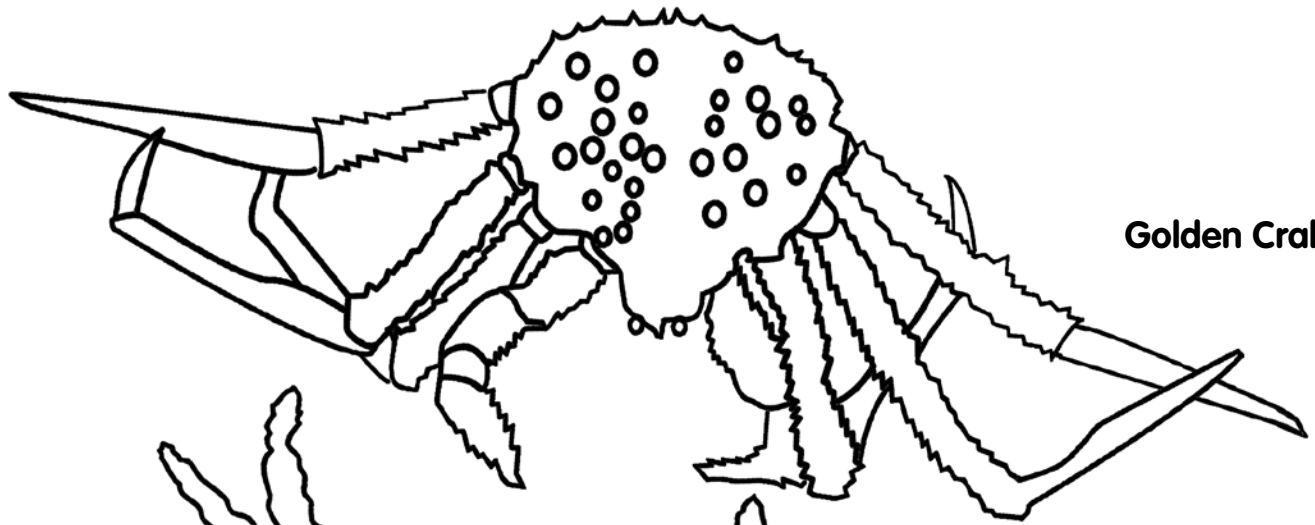
Reef fish are colorful fish. Amberjack, Snapper and Grouper are found around reefs.

Mahi-Mahi / Dolphins

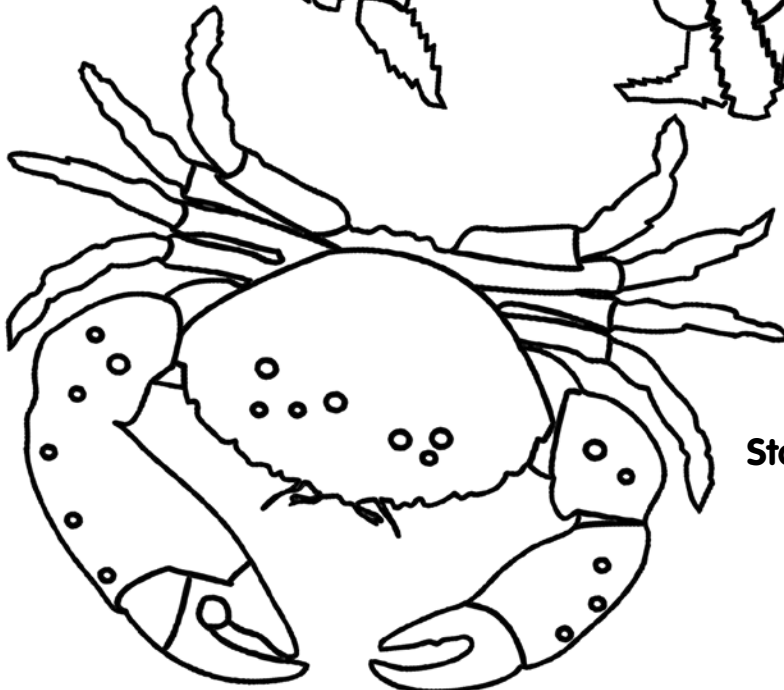


The Mahi-Mahi, also known as Dolphin, is not the same as a porpoise. The porpoise is a mammal. The Mahi-Mahi is a fish.

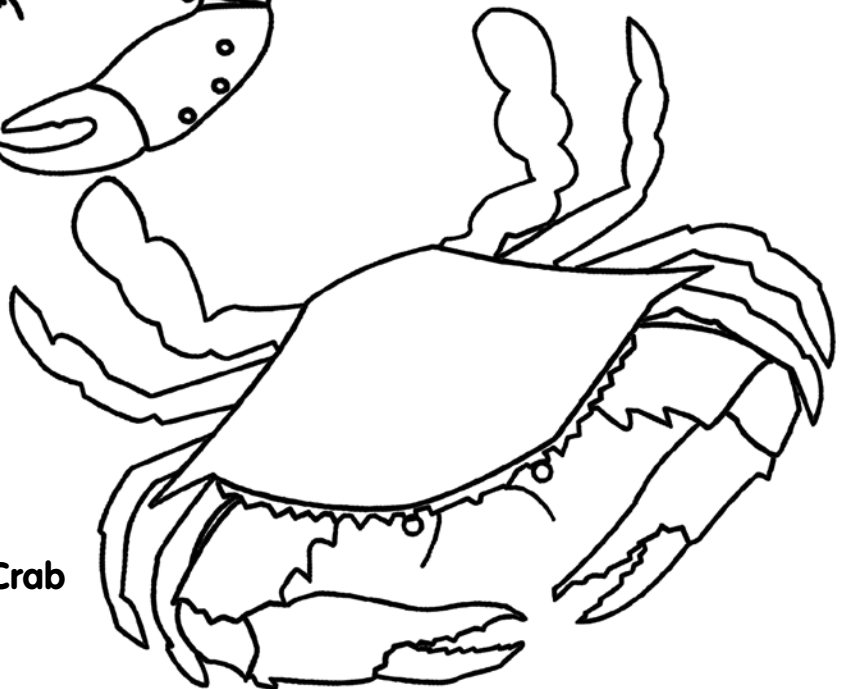

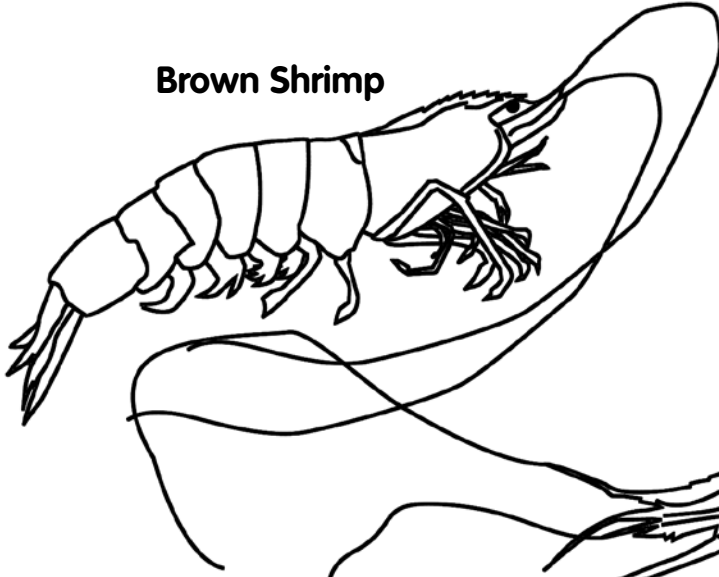
Shrimp



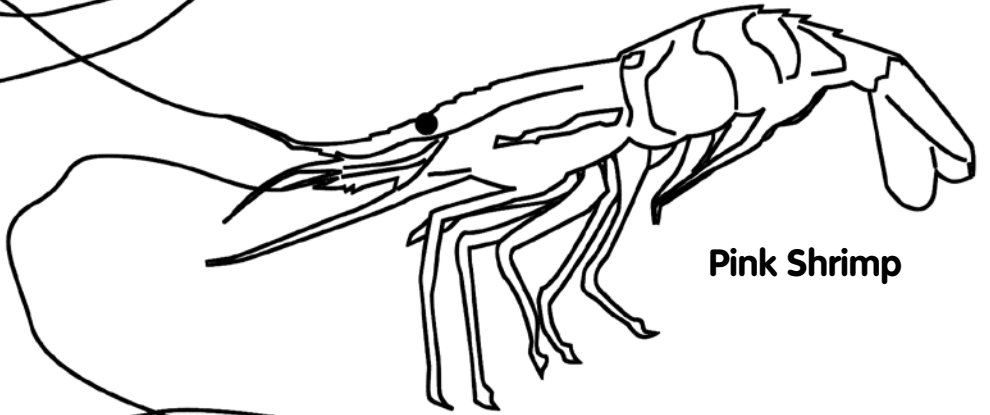
In Florida, shrimp are harvested with trawls, cone-shaped nets, towed along the bottom in waters near shore. The nets have doors to let turtles out.

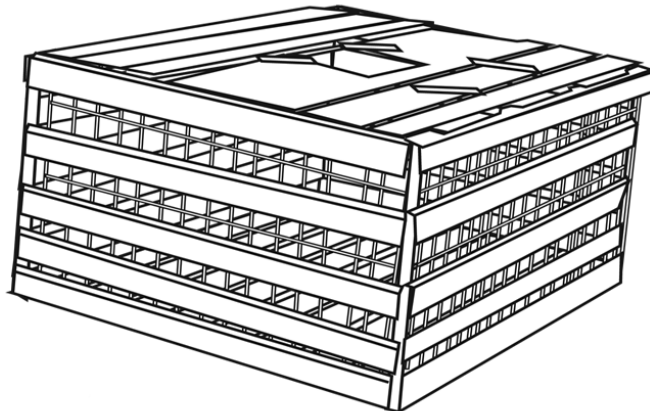
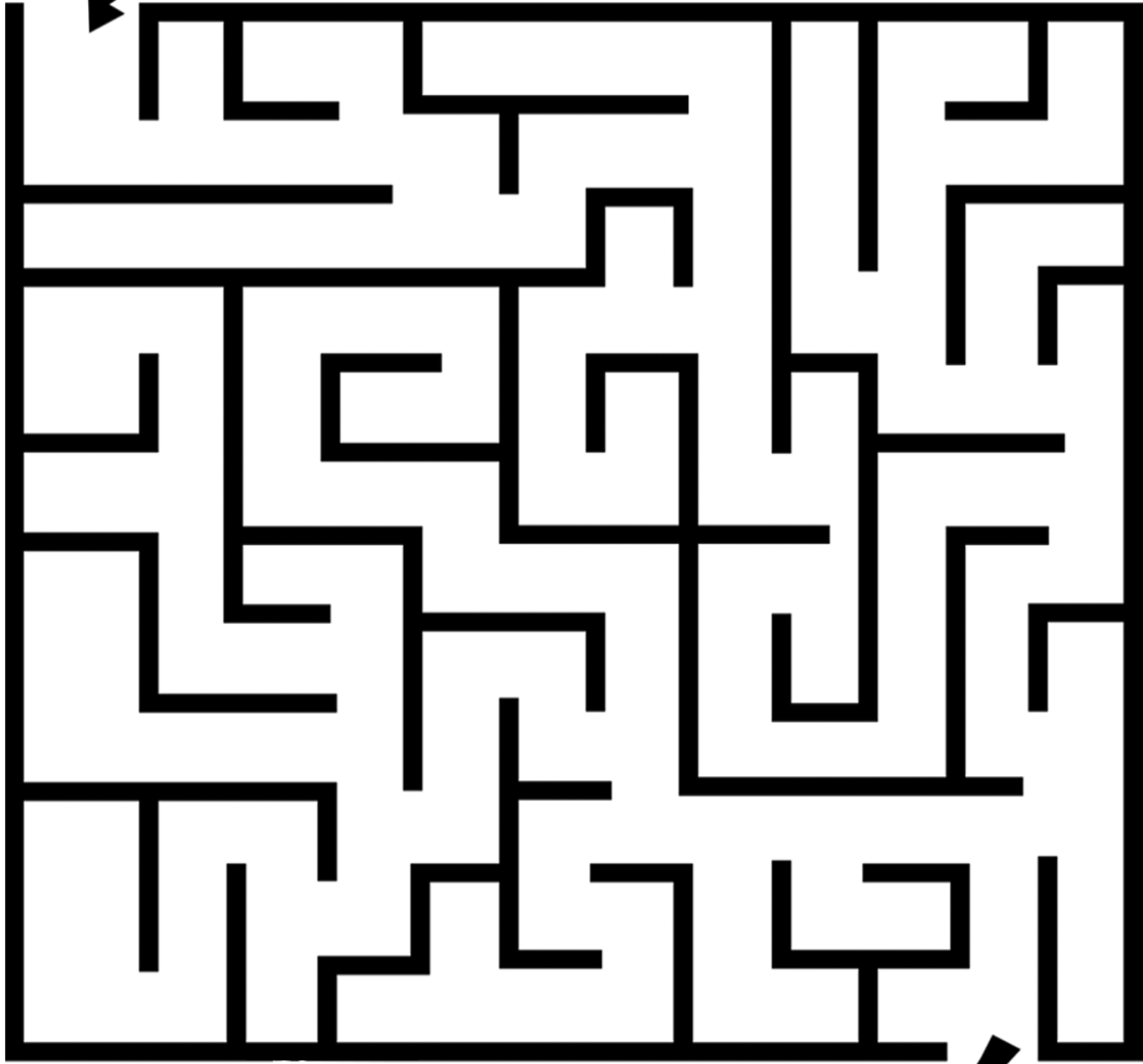
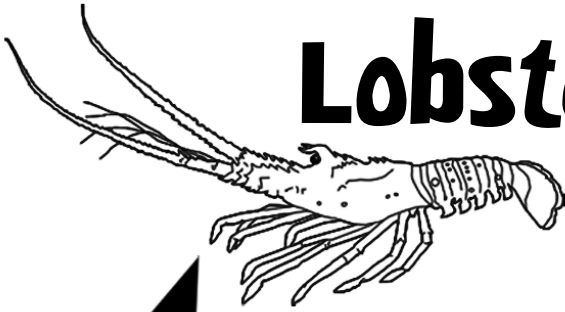


Spiny Lobster

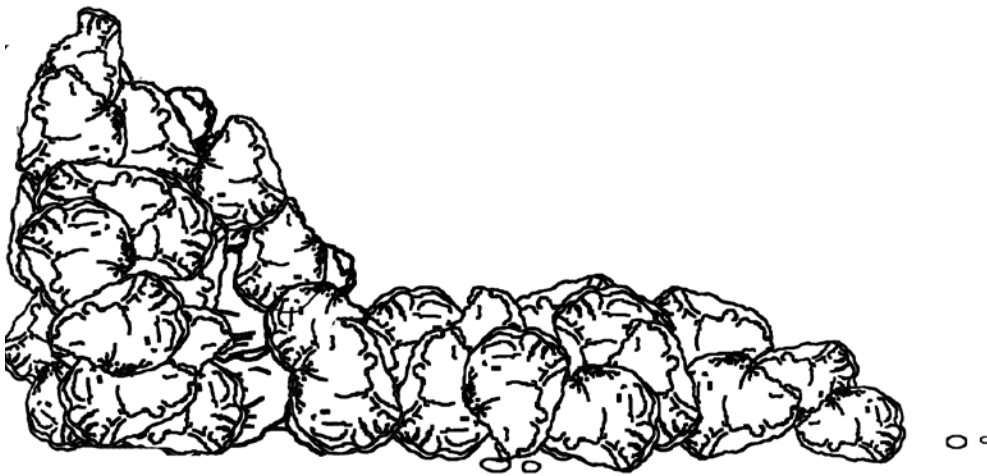
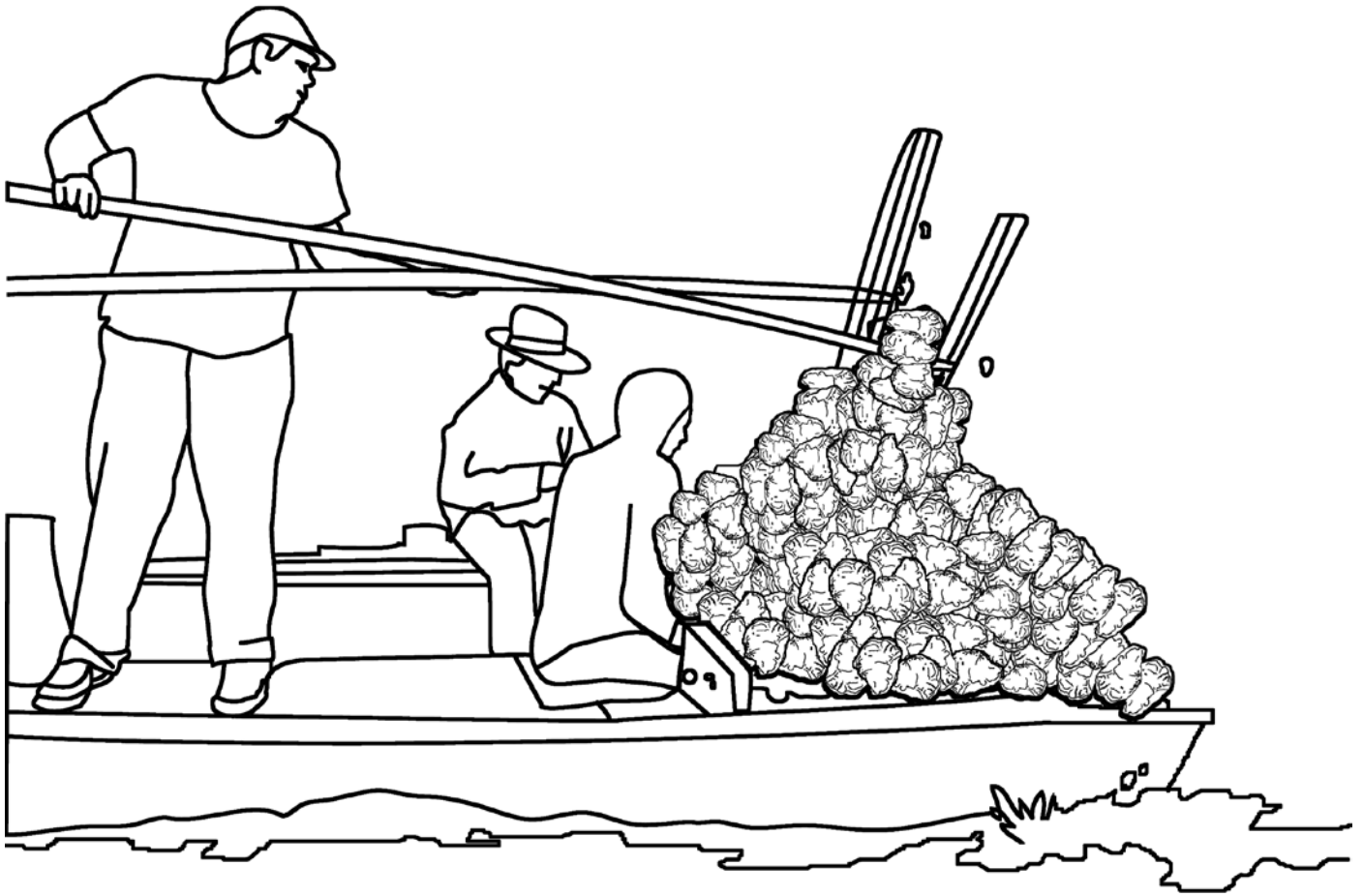


The Spiny Lobster has many spines on the body, two horns, a pair of long antennae and five pairs of walking legs.

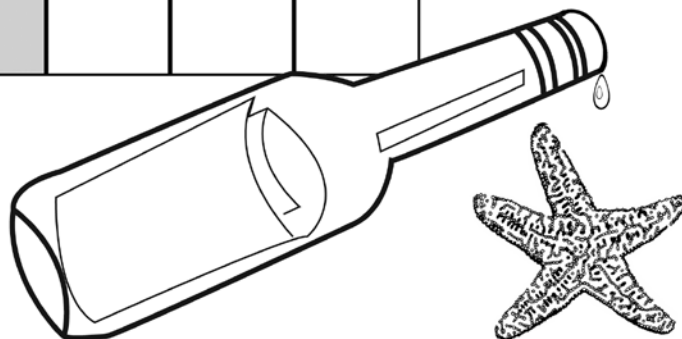

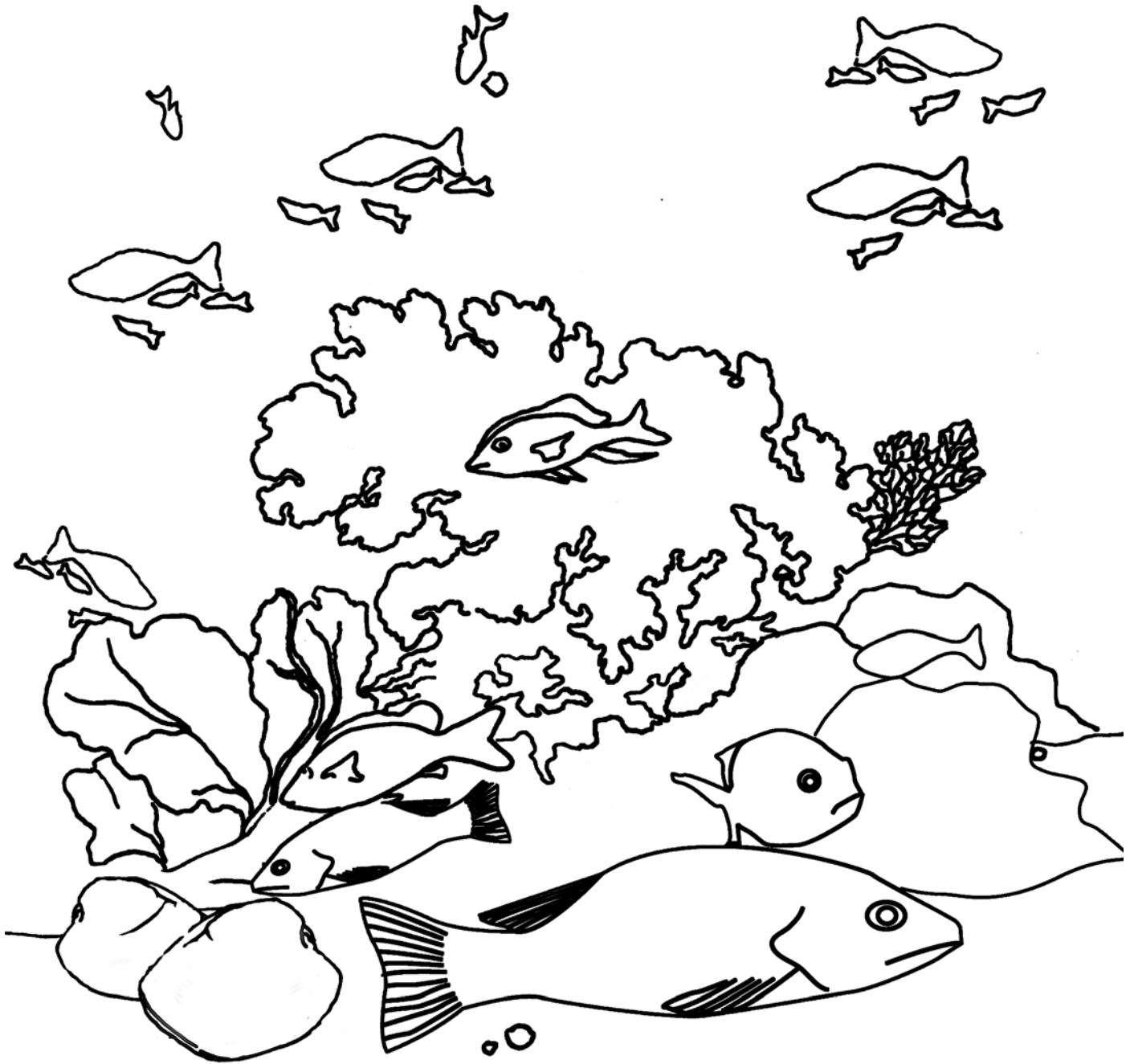

Aquaculture or Aqua farming



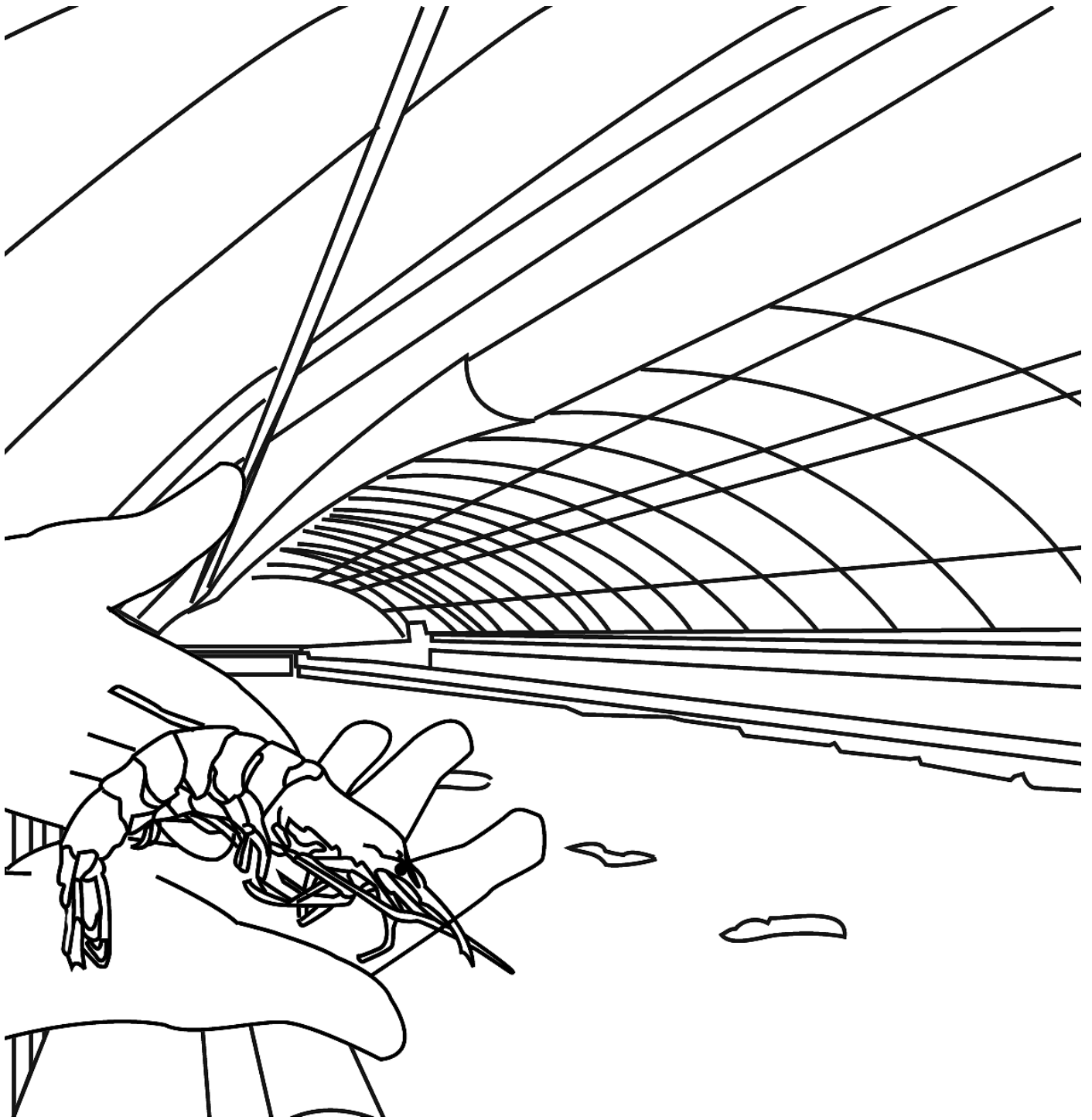
Aquaculture is the growing of plants, marine or freshwater species in water.

Farm-Raised Clams



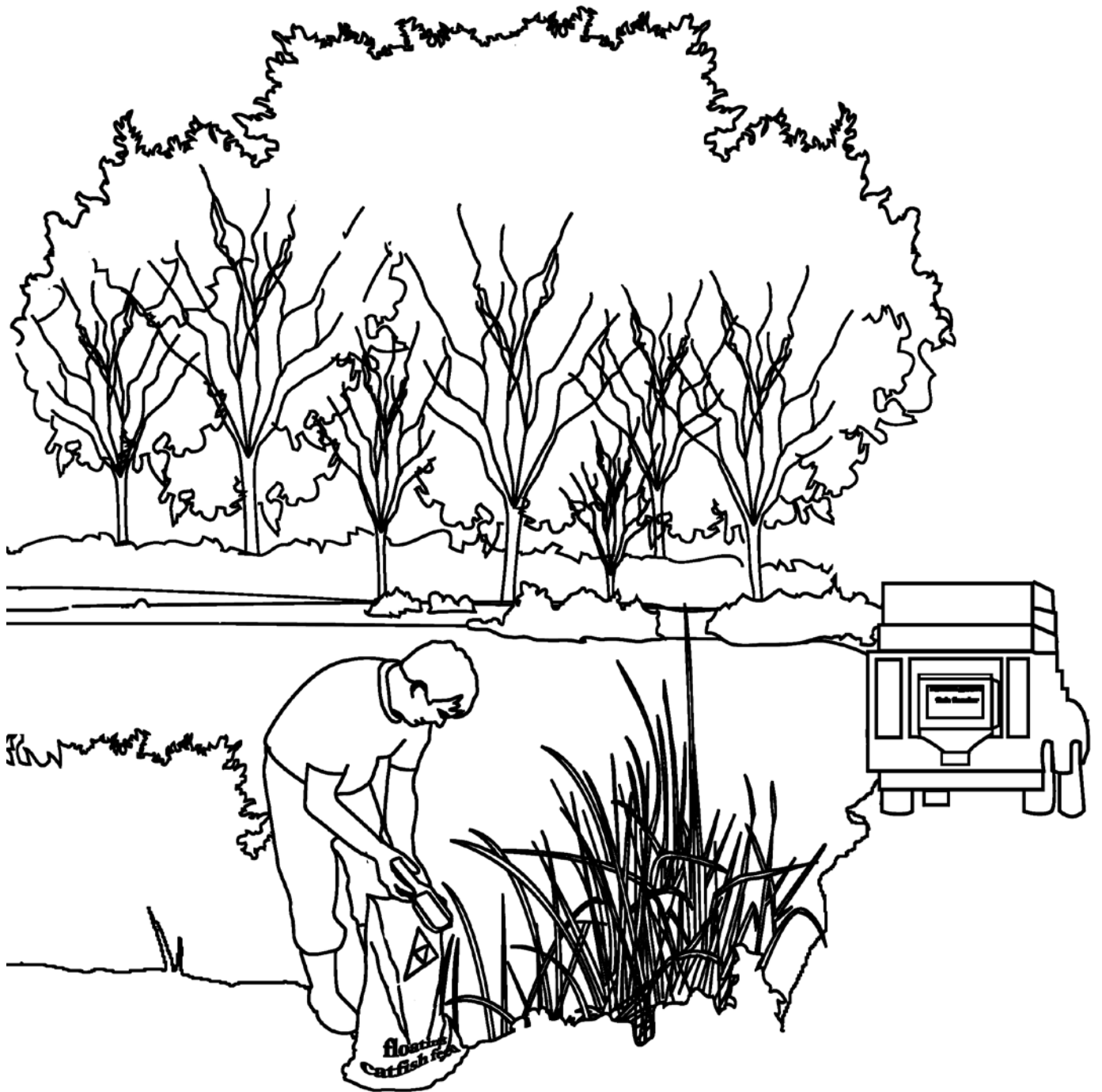
Clams are placed in protective nylon mesh bags to grow in the ocean.

Farm-Raised Shrimp



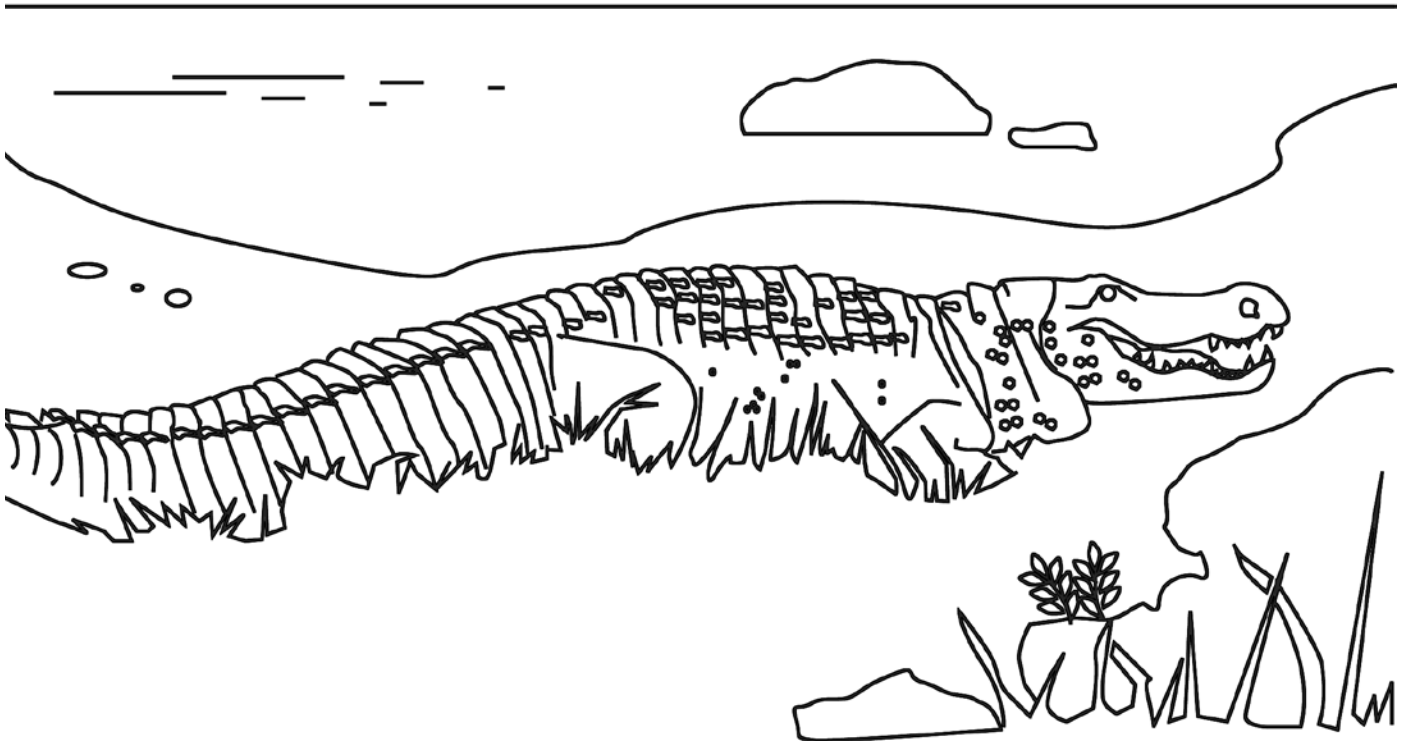
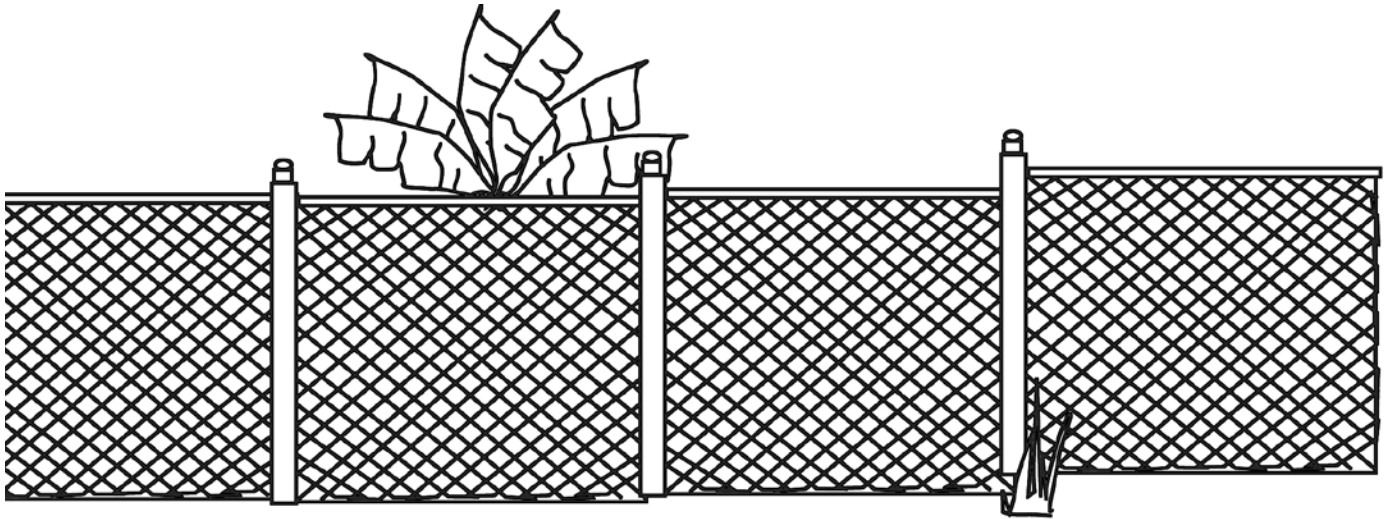
Florida farm-raised Shrimp are naturally grown without chemicals.
